LUNGWORM

Roundworms can also infect people and can be associated with epilepsy, asthma and reduced learning ability in children as well as causing blindness.⁷⁻¹⁰


To stop eggs being laid and passed on, roundworm prevention needs to be given every month.⁶



1 in 3 dogs carries **ticks**¹³ but they are often hard to spot.

Ticks feed on dogs for days causing discomfort and sometimes passing on serious infections such as Lyme disease.¹⁴
